HOW DOES IT WORK?

The "Access to College – First Nations" pathway is two semesters at the most followed by a maximum of two transitional semesters. Transitional semester course titles will be chosen according to your academic pathway and needs. At the end of this first year of collegiate studies, you'll have the opportunity to pursue your pathway in accordance with the project that you will have determined within supervised activities. After the last transitional semester, you must necessarily present an application to register in one of our programs if you wish to continue to study.

OVERALL OBJECTIVES

The objective of "Access to College" is to allow students who meet the basic admission requirements for Cégep to follow collegial classes while they:

- Decide on their specific career choice
- Develop intellectual work abilities or personal skills likely to increase their chances of succeeding
- Complete high-school prerequisites for admission to the program of their choice

DURATION

Usually, "Access to College" lasts two semesters. The course titles will change from a semester to another according to student's progress and needs. At the end of "Access to College", the student will carry on with the plan he made for the future through the support activities.

OBAKWADAN PROJECT - EXCLUSIVE

Our partnership with the Adult Education Center of Lac-Simon allows us to offer high-school level courses right here on campus. It is a great opportunity for you to complete your diploma while taking college level courses at the same time.

To be part of this project, the units missing should not exceed 10.
